AUSTRALIAN DIVERSITY I INDIGENOUS AUSTRALIANS

- 40,000 to 50,000++ years of history here
 - 250+ languages 600+ dialects
 - Richly diverse cultures
 - Many societies / nations / religions
- 2.8% of Australians identify as indigenous
- RELIGIOUS / CULTURAL DIVERSITY IS PART OF OUR DEEP HISTORY/NORMAL

- More Pentecostals (3.4%) than Uniting (3.3%)
- More Muslims (2.6%) than Pres (2.3%)
- More Buddhists (2.4%) than Orthodox (2.1%)
- More Hindus (1.9%) than Baptists (1.5%)
- More Sikhs (0.5%) than Jews (0.4%)
- 3 X Witches (6.6k) as Quakers (1.7k),
- Pagans (15.2k), Baha'i (14.0k)
- Atheists* (32k; 0.14%) Agnostics (26k, 0.11%)

BASIC DRIVERS OF CURRENT CHANGE

MIGRATION

- Diversity (Muslims, Buddhists, Hindus, Sikhs)
 - > Keeping Catholics afloat
 - > Nones (Chinese and European)

Conversion

- To Pentecostal (from other groups/ not 'none')
- To 'NONE', but most are born none
- FAILURE OF BOOMERS AND GEN X TO PASS RELIGION ON TO CHILDREN



A NEW AUSTRALIA I:

'Nones' the dominant group

- 'Nones' are the most numerous in each age group till 65+ (2016 Census)
- 'None' is the new normal (AGZ data)
 - 52% of those 13-18 identify as 'no religion'
 - 58% of teens never attend religious services
 - Imp Rel Faith: no 36%, some 42%, very 22%Not religious, but not anti-religious
- Now those who have a religion have to explain themselves being in the minority
 - Many not comfortable being in minority



A NEW AUSTRALIA

- Passing of White British Protestantism
 - Fading effect of White Australia Policy
 - We are all minorities!!!
- Churches are becoming sects oppositional
 - reactionary nostalgic binaries vs. new diversities
 - Re-differentiation harden boundaries
- New Reality = vibrant youth, hyper-diversity
- Religion out of the control of formally organised groups and the state



Difference Difference

- To this point Australia viewed as a mosaic
- But what of the 'one-colour' pieces
 - E.g. 1.6 Billion ways to be a Muslim
- Religion and spirituality are out of the control of both 'church' and state.
 - > Freely, immediately available at a click
 - > FRB issues rise as religion is politicised
- Religious identity tells very little, and less
- As an examination of Aus Teens tells us

AUSTRALIAN GEN Z: OUR APPROACH:

- First we conducted focus groups all over Australia in High Schools in order to hear what teens had to say, what spirituality and religion meant to them.
- Drawing on this we constructed the questions for a national representative RDDM survey of teenagers conducted in late 2017.
- Then we used latent class analysis to identify types of 'spirituality'.
- Plus follow-up interviews

The spirituality types of Australian teens (% of population aged 13-18) I

- THIS-WORLDLY: 23% There is no place in their worldview for religious, spiritual or non-material possibilities
- INDIFFERENT/QUESTIONERS: 15% Indifferent to religion, spirituality, and atheism
- SPIRITUAL BUT NOT RELIGIOUS: 18% God, faith, religion are not important to them, but the door is open. (passive)

The spirituality types of Australian teens (% of population aged 13-18) II

- SEEKERS: 8% They have a decidedly eclectic worldview, seeking out their spiritual truth. (Active)
- NOMINALLY RELIGIOUS: 20% Culturally religious, mainly following their parents/guardians or community identity
- RELIGIOUSLY COMMITTED: 17% Religious faith, Christian (mainly Pentecostal and evangelical), Islam, Buddhist, Hindu or something else, is a big part of their lives.

Follow-up Inteviews

- 1. Teens agreed with the types and their location in them
- 2. Teens appalled that religious groups are given exemptions from Human Rights legislation.
- 3. Teens totally opposed to any discriminatory actions by anyone toward LGBTIQ+ people

WAGZ SUMMARY

- Australian AGZ(13-18) are awash, but NOT adrift in a sea of diversity.
 - They know who they are.
 - Are very comfortable with difference religious, gender, sexuality.
 - 14% LGBTQI, 85% schools to allow openness
 - If curious will engage respectfully/Whatever.
- People can live ethically w/o religion (83%)
- Multi-faith → Aus better place to live (91%)



Hyperdiversity and Postsecularity

- A great increase in the diversity of diversities
 - Migration from South Asia
 - No diversity free zone in Melbourne
 - Successful rural communities diverse
- No binaries apply
 - No single us vs them, religious vs secular
- = Post secularity (not a return to the past)
 - A whole new world



POLICY IMPLICATIONS

A more contested, and confused policy context

- The 'seriously' religious minority demand respect, freedom, protection, more separate schools, clear boundaries
- •Rise of SBNRs→ respect for diversity, fluidity
- •Rise of no religion -> freedom from religion
- •More pressure for/against: school chaplaincy, SRI pgms, education about religions, accept complexity in ways of being diversity.
